THE HISTORY BOYS: A CHALLENGING HISTORY


It is rare to find a work of theatre with quite so many complex themes woven through it as Alan Bennett's 'The History Boys' which is set for a Tasmanian debut at The Playhouse Theatre this month.

The show mixes the youth and exuberance of a coming of age comedy, with an intellectual clash of the generations as the classical confronts the modern, there is however a darker undertone. The play takes on controversial and sometimes raw topic of inappropriateness between educators and pupils, something that remains depressingly pertinent in modern day Tasmania.

Set in the 1980s in Yorkshire, the play follows 8 boys (played locally by a talented and gender diverse cast) as they return for one final term at school to try and win access to study history at Oxford and Cambridge university. They are taught by three very different styles of teacher, the utilitarian Mrs Lintott (played by Di Richards), the classical Hector (Played by Paul Levett) and the contemporary (played by Rhys Prestedge). The show explores the changes to education in the Thatcher years and the change to the post modern (and increasingly post truth) era of education. A truly challenging work.

Hobart Rep have entrusted the play to the direction of a teacher in Beck Goldsmith, whom is capable of understanding not only the educational nuance, but also the safeguarding required to sensitively and safely handle material of this nature. Goldsmith said of the work "It questions the techniques and intentions of the teaching profession and the nature of relationships between educator and pupil. It really encourages the actors to think about the difference in time between now and 30-40yrs ago and how perceptions of what is acceptable behaviour have changed."

The History Boys Opens on the 28th of August and runs until the 7th of September. Tickets are available from Playhouse.org.au.



How and when did BMB get involved with HRTS?

In 2024, Butler McIntyre and Butler is celebrating 200 years of continual practice. The firm commenced in 1824, by Gamaliel Butler, who arrived in Hobart in 1824 with his wife Sarah and quickly commenced legal practice. At that time, the legal community of the then Van Dieman's land was very much in its infancy, with the Supreme Court of Tasmania having been established in May earlier that year. The firm commenced practicing from 22 Murray St in 1888 and remains practicing from 20, 22 and 24 Murray St today.

Since Gamaliel Butler commenced practice in 1824, the law firm has been operated by 40 partners, with some serving as long as 55 years. Butler McIntyre and Butler is the oldest and one of the most respected law firms in Tasmania.

Play Reading Achievement

It was something of a pleasant surprise when we realised that the Rep Playreading series had passed its eighth birthday! The first play reading in the current series was presented in May 2016 which kicked off with the script for *We Are Gathered Here Today*, written by Bill Pearson. The most recent playreading, *Fleur Fleur*, was written by LA Web and presented in late July 2024 to an audience of over 30 people.

The readings are a part of Rep's ongoing commitment to supporting the development of local theatre, with three or four presented each year at our rehearsal space at Creek Road New Town. Since it started, the series has seen numerous actors and playwrights (and the odd dramaturg) involved, all of whom have generously volunteered their talent and creativity in support of local theatre.

The play reading is an important part of theatre work and one which helps a playwright refine their script to the point that it is ready to be staged. It can also be a good learning opportunity for actors to develop their own skills while also contributing feedback to the writer's creative development process.

The Rep series is generally aimed at first readings which enables a playwright to hear their script read for the very first time. The intention is not only to give the script 'a voice' but also to allow the writer to gain feedback from a very knowledgeable audience and cast. Playwrights are welcome to invite their consulting dramaturg along and plays can be one-act or longer with the total reading time limited to a maximum of two hours for any particular session.

From the Archives

Hobart Rep Member – Sir Stanley Burbury



Younger members of the Hobart Repertory Theatre Society may not be aware that there have been many past members who were also prominent community leaders. One of these was undoubtedly Stanley Burbury who went on to be knighted and was Tasmania's first Australian-born governor.

Stanley was born in 1909 in Western Australia but was raised in Hobart by his aunt after the death of his mother when he was two months of age. He contracted polio as a child which left him with a life-long limp. He attended The Hutchins School where he was a prize-winning student, then completed law at the University of Tasmania. In 1934, he married Pearl Barren who was an accomplished local soprano and ballet dancer. By the age of twenty eight, Stanley had been made a partner in a prominent Hobart legal firm.

Stanley and Pearl were active members of Hobart's theatrical scene throughout the 1930s, 40s and 50s. Stanley was an accomplished actor and he also directed no fewer than seven Rep productions in the 1940s, including *The Importance of Being Ernest* (1943), *The Way of The World* (1947) and *Murder on The Nile* (1949). In 1950, Stanley was elected president of the Hobart Rep committee and also served as our patron for many later years in the 20th century.

Stanley was appointed the state's Solicitor-General in 1952 and became Tasmanian governor in 1973, a role he held for nine years. The University of Tasmania has a performance/lecture theatre named in his honour. He died in April 1995. It is worth noting that one of the state premiers who served under Stanley's governorship was Bill Neilsen, who was also a prominent member of Hobart Rep. But that's another story for another day...
